**O**n 25th January 112 Club Members and their guests assembled at The Caledonian Club in Belgravia to celebrate the 251st anniversary of the birth of the Scottish Bard, Rabbin Burns.

Following the Selkirk Grace by Neil Cameron, the haggis was ceremoniously piped around the room. Alderman Roger Gifford, suitably attired in full highland dress, delivered the traditional address to the haggis. At the end of a splendid meal of haggis and neeps, with a nip of single malt highland whisky, roast cannon of Herdwick lamb and cranachan, the President lead the toasts to The Queen and then The Lord Mayor and The City of London Corporation.

The President welcomed everybody in a very entertaining manner followed by Alderman Roger Gifford who proposed the toast to the Immortal Memory, paying tribute in both verse and song including the poem, "Address to the Toothache", and the song "Ca' the Yowes to the Knowes" (Calling in the sheep) concluding the toast with "Ode to a Bottle of Whisky".

Tim Knox, proposed the toast to the Lassies also referring to Burns' songs and poems which exemplified the writer's love and appreciation of women. Burns was well ahead of his time when in 1792, at the age of 33 he wrote "The Rights of Woman" demonstrating his belief in equality of the sexes. The reply on behalf of the Lassies was given by Alexandra Marks, Immediate Past Master of the Solicitors' Company. While expressing concern that a philanderer such as Burns should be held in such high esteem, Alexandra acknowledged that he was ahead of his time with his views on equality. She delivered an amusing reminder to the gentlemen as to how things have changed since Burns' time. The Lassies were then invited to rise and drink a toast to the gentlemen.

The Farewell was given by the President, after which proceedings were brought to a close with the singing of Burns most famous song "Auld Lang Syne"

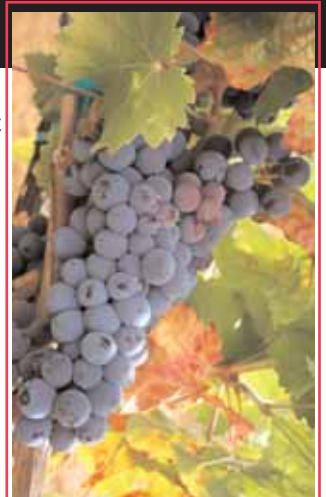

# DOWGATE FIRE STATION

**O**n one of the few fine days in February our President, Alderman Alison Gowman arranged a visit for twenty four members and their guests to the Dowgate Fire Station, the only one in the City of London and of course in our President's Ward.

We were assembled in one of the training rooms where we were given short but very informative talks on various aspects of the activities of the Fire Station.

Our first talk was by Station Manager Steve Norman who is in charge of the actual fire and rescue operations all illustrated by slides showing a major fire in a high rise residential building; rescue of a person from heights even where no fire is involved; rescue from the Thames and the handling of hazardous materials. He then spoke about the Fire Regulations and how they had been all brought into one document making it easier for those responsible for premises to ensure that they have the correct degree of fire protection in place, and also the role of the fire service in the enforcement of those regulations.

Each call out costs about £300. Automated Fire Detection systems are responsible for over 53,000 call outs annually of which over 50,000 are false alarms.

Our next speaker was Mr Paul Eskriett who is the Principal Security and Contingency Planning Adviser to the Corporation of London. Prior to being appointed to the Corporation he was a Chief Superintendent with the City of London Police with 30 years service. He also illustrated his talk with a number of slides showing how many effective but aesthetically pleasing barriers had been put in place, and how the organisation he is responsible for co-ordinates with the other London Boroughs.



Our final speaker was the Group Manager Peter Mansi, the Head of Fire Investigation throughout Greater London, obviously it is a honour for Dowgate to have this responsibility within their remit. The cause of fires are many and are from similar causes worldwide, he therefore is in regular contact with colleagues in many countries and on the day of our visit had two French Officers undertaking some training as the UK is regarded as the leader in Fire Prevention and Investigation.

Following this interesting talk we were then given an escorted tour of the Fire Station. We were divided into two groups, and the group I joined was led by Peter Mansi who showed us inter alia the staff rest rooms, training facilities, investigation offices and the 'firemen's poles'. These enable the officers on each floor to reach the ground very quickly, two of the poles descending from the second floor! After viewing the Fire Engines and the premises we were told that the Station was to undergo further extension to increase its capacity from a single engine to four vehicles.

The tour over our President then led us to 'The Bolt Hole' for an excellent lunch.
